

This has been a tremendous year at the Beaufort Regional Chamber of Commerce. Serving as your Chairman has been not only a privilege, but an honor.

We are proud of our organization's accomplishments over the last year, and they would have never come to fruition without the collaborative efforts of our members, our ambassadors, our staff, our community partners and our committee members. We all worked together to advocate for a pro-business environment, help protect our military assets, develop a strong workforce, and attract an increasing number of tourists to our market.

We were honored to host the homecoming celebration of the VMFAT-501 Squadron, the first of five F-35 squadrons that will call MCAS Beaufort home. We also surveyed our members and found the need to inform the public around the national and local debate of Offshore Drilling, so we put together a panel of experts that gave hundreds of citizens the chance to hear both sides of the issue and have their questions answered.

In the last year we have considered more than a dozen state and national bills, plus local tax and spending programs that would have an impact on commerce. We have stood by the Town of Port Royal and state lawmakers in their fight to force the State Ports Authority to sell the port property, our region's most under-utilized asset.

Our greatest work as a region is still ahead. We need to diversify our economy. We need jobs that will give our students the opportunity to work for a good wage right here at home. What we need is a holistic approach to economic development. We need a data driven plan that measures risk and return on investment. Now is the time for all of our local governments and stakeholders to work in a cohesive way that will show that we're serious. We ask that you please work with us to create the preferred community to invest, prosper and enjoy.

How we help our Chamber members...

- Conducted a procurement workshop on how to do business with the government
- Successfully held Beaufort Restaurant Week in January and planning to follow-up with a second week in August
- Held State of the Schools breakfast featuring updates from Beaufort County School District, Technical College of the Lowcountry and University of South Carolina Beaufort
- Hosted State of the Bases breakfast allowing our members and the community to receive important updates from our three local military installations. The Military Affairs Committee honored a Military Family of the Quarter
- Encouraged Beaufort County Council to give the citizens the right to vote on the Capital Penny by placing it on the ballot in November 2014. While this initiative did not pass, the Chamber will advocate for a penny on the ballot in 2016
- Hosted the U.S. Small Business Administration to share information to help businesses start, strengthen and expand
- Conducted our first ever Speed Networking event to introduce members and their services
- Added employee benefit solution partnership with Colonial Life
- Hosted Founders Night Fireworks in the Henry C.
 Chambers Waterfront Park on New Year's Eve



Your Chamber's Top Legislative Priorities 2015

- Support renourishing the beach at Hunting Island State Park and the completion of the Spanish Moss Trail
- Support the critically important widening projects to South Carolina's interstates, fixing loadrestricted and deficient bridges and resurfacing existing roadways
- Support for aerospace and related industries to complement the F-35 Training Center at MCAS-Beaufort to boost and diversify our Lowcountry economy
- Improve the Beaufort Regional economic business climate to create a competitive environment
- Supports job creation and job retention initiatives for economic development
- Streamline the processes to start, maintain and grow businesses in the Beaufort Region

- 2 Reduce the cost of doing business
- 3 Manage growth and support infrastructure so that the marketability of the area isn't threatened
- 4 Increase the qualified workforce

Education Workforce Development

Developing a highly-skilled and well-educated workforce is integral to increased job opportunities and security with dynamic companies doing business in the Beaufort region.

Our Manufacturer's Alliance works quickly and efficiently to respond to the demands of the business community. This year, SC Department of Employment and Workforce's Executive Director Cheryl Stanton facilitated a conversation on working to match job seekers with employers quickly, efficiently and effectively.

Our mission: To bridge the gap between education and business, ensuring a more qualified, ready-to-work employee base. The Beaufort Regional Chamber of Commerce recognizes the need to provide a quality workforce for our business community and to help recruit new and viable

The Chamber's Education/Workforce Committee is partnering with Goodwill Industries Job Link Center to kick off a Dressed to Impress initiative, where we collect professional clothing to help provide job seekers with the attire they need.

Top legislative priorities for Education/Workforce Development:

- Modify the allocation formula for public education funding using criteria other than a school system's ability to raise revenue through property tax to a system where all students receive equitable funding
- Continue efforts to maintain Beaufort County as a Work Ready Community
- Encourage and support programs for transitioning military personnel to the local workforce
- Seek increased funding for higher education including technical colleges and parity funding for the University of South Carolina Beaufort





During 2014-2015, the MEC worked tirelessly to support and promote our vibrant military community. Highlights include:

- "Homecoming" celebration for VMFAT-501 and the F-35B training center with the new Joint Strike Fighters. This marked the return of the Warlords squadron to MCAS Beaufort – flying the nation's newest and state-of-the-art fighter-attack jet
- Continued work with the Department of Defense, federal agencies and Congress to seek an outlying landing field to supplement runways at MCAS Beaufort
- Release of a new South Carolina study indicating our three military installations contribute \$1.498 billion annually to our local economy
- Traveled to Washington, DC to meet with Congressional and DoD leaders about Beaufort's bases and in April we hosted U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham
